

Minutes of a Meeting of FULBOURN PARISH COUNCIL held in The Fulbourn Centre, Home End, Fulbourn on Wednesday, 13th January 2016.

<p>105 To accept apologies for absence. Cllrs Dawson and Sitton; and Cllrs Bullen and Scarr for lateness.</p>	
<p>106 To notify the clerk of any declarations of interest that will be declared by members for any item to be discussed.</p>	
<p>107 Local Housing Needs; Cambridgeshire Acre and Accent Nene attending to give Survey update. Helen Fortune from Accent Nene advised she had worked on the Windmill Estate regeneration now known as The Swifts. Accent Nene has been working with Cambridgeshire Acre regarding housing needs and a survey for the village was commissioned in December in agreement with the Parish Council. Mark Deas, from Cambridgeshire Acre said they hoped to deliver Affordable Housing for local people. <i>Cllr Scarr arrived at this point.</i> 2193 surveys were delivered in the parish generating 401 responses which equates to 18%. Usually the response is between 20% - 30% but is often lower in larger villages. A report of the survey results is still being compiled, however Mr Deas said it showed 73% supported Affordable Housing in principle, 22% said no and 3% did not answer. Those in favour wanted young people to be able to stay in the area, provide housing for local people depending on the location and scale of the development and deal with the infrastructure more housing would generate. Those voting against raised concerns about the impact on the character of the village believing Fulbourn could not cope with more housing. Some felt that The Swifts should have dealt with housing needs. Mr Deas said that project took several years to complete and changes in government legislation meant that had not been possible. Cllr Scarr said as the government had changed rules during The Swifts development, was it likely to happen again. Mr Deas confirmed it was with regard to Affordable Housing as a Housing & Planning Bill was going through parliament now. He gave figures of those on the Housing Register and from the survey how many people felt their present housing was suitable for their needs. The report is still a work in progress and he would like to come back, probably at the March meeting, to present the completed report. Helen Fortune said Accent Nene had identified a plot of land near the Balsham Road lay-by as an Exception Site and had been looking at it for a number of years. Accent Nene had been close to a deal with the landowner who then decided he wanted more housing and to put the site on the open market. Accent Nene then began working with Hill Residential Housing to buy the site rather than another developer. Jointly they wish to bring the scheme forward whilst addressing local needs. They are looking to build 30 houses consisting of 12 Affordable; 8 for rent and 4 shared ownership and 18 for the open market. James Thomas from Hill said there was an opportunity to increase the percentage of Affordable Housing units. They wanted to work on a scheme to benefit the village. Cllr Ward asked if they were also considering the opposite side of Balsham Road, and Helen Fortune confirmed they had been looking at that site too. Under the Local Lettings Policy, housing would be for people who lived or worked in the village or had close family in Fulbourn. The Chairman thanked everyone for their presentation.</p>	
<p>108 Fulbourn Primary School Report. Joy Eldridge presented the attached report. Members discussed expanding the school and the Chairman asked if consideration had been given when the Ida Darwin site is developed as this</p>	

had been designated for almost 200 dwellings. Mrs Eldridge will make enquiries.

Public & Press - You are invited to attend the whole meeting and are welcome to speak at our Open Forum at the beginning of the meeting.

Mary Greer said she was purchasing the Old Rectory in Church Lane from The Edmund Trust, Eddie's formerly Mencap, and was setting up a school. She gave Members a brief history of her background including that she had set up the Cambridge International School based in Cherryhinton. To set up in the village, Ms Greer had been working with a group of people which included an ex-head teacher and ex-deputy head; the school in Fulbourn would have a high ratio of teachers to children; would be for both international and English. It would wish to use local sporting facilities, employ local tradespeople in providing school lunches and offer care during school holidays. The school would be there for able children and those with other needs would benefit from working in smaller groups. The 10-16 year olds would be encouraged to be artistic and creative and the school would want to work with the community. Cllr Newell was concerned about what would happen to those attending Eddie's. Ms Greer said the site was being sold so funding could assist clients by providing a better quality of provision elsewhere. They do have premises in Milton.

When asked about parking and access issues, Mary Greer said children intake would be done gradually eventually accommodating 100 pupils but they would be using bus services and not having parents dropping and picking up the children.

109 To receive reports from County and District Councillors.

109.1. County and District Councillor Williams issued the attached reports. Cllr Ward asked if we should write to CCC asking if any of the funds awarded when Balfour Beatty was penalised for the street lighting contract could be used to reinstate columns Fulbourn had to forego. Cllr Williams said this came under the PFI (Private Finance Initiative) so it would not be possible. Cllr Bullen arrived at this point.

111 Matters arising from the last meeting.

111.1 Pavilion upgrade. Cllr Newell will be speaking to the Football Association regarding funding. A report and draft plans have just been received from the architect for consideration.

111.2 Impett's Lane. Cllr Ward reported problems with flooding which was up to 8" deep in places earlier this week. The Clerk will chase the contractors to have the drain flushed.

111.5 Teversham Road. Cllr Cone gave a verbal report on the Save Fulbourns Fields (SFF) meeting he had attended on Tuesday 12 January 2016. SFF wanted the parish to be represented at the Appeal. Cllr Williams had said he could get legal representation for about £600 and would make enquiries. SFF could raise some of this from private individuals and would expect the PC to make up any difference. The Clerk reported that she had had a visit from Richard Townley who had also asked that the PC make a donation of £600 for this legal representation. Council knew that Castlefield would be represented by a top QC and that SCDC would also be instructing leading counsel and were very sceptical that £600 would be anywhere near enough to instruct an expert. It was felt that £600 would barely buy 2 hours of a solicitor's time and to instruct a barrister, which Council felt would be necessary as leading counsel would cross examine, would cost thousands of pounds. It was noted that Council had not received any formal application from SFF apart from Mr Townley's verbal request that council consider donating £600. Regarding Council instructing counsel, this was discussed at length and after much discussion council were of the opinion that, owing to the high cost of instructing legal counsel and the fact that SCDC would have expert representation, Council

could not justify spending a lot of money on a barrister when SCDC were representing the parish. It was also felt that this could set a precedent but each case would be judged on its merits. Regarding the PC making a donation it was agreed to wait until SFF made a formal request to the PC for a donation and this would then be considered by Council. SFF would also need to let council have full details of the person to be instructed and a full breakdown of costs.

Cllr Bullen proposed Cllr Drage and Thorn sign the documents, proposal seconded by Cllr Scarr and agreed by Council. Cllrs Drage and Thorn duly signed the indemnities.

County Councillor Report to Fulbourn Parish Council

1. We have been told by county council officers that the Government revenue support grant settlement for Cambridgeshire for 2016/17 is £5 million lower than budgeted for (we are already having to find £41 million in cuts); that is on top of the fact that the National Living Wage is not funded (£6 million) nor the additional cut to public health (£2 million).
2. To make it easier for parish councils to undertake gritting and snow clearing of footpaths and minor roads you can now go on-line on the county council website to be trained so that you are covered not only by the council's third party liability insurance but also its personal injury insurance. To carry out the work you need to tell highways the routes you intend to do and complete a form afterwards. The council will supply grit free of charge but you will need to provide safe and dry storage and the high visibility clothing and equipment. Looking to next year at present the coverage of road gritting will be reduced by about a third because of cuts in government funding.
3. County highways have asked parish councils to remind homeowners to keep their hedges trimmed back from footpaths. It has to deal with a big increase in incidents of overgrown vegetation and money spent on this means less money for highway maintenance.

4. Public consultation on the City Deal cycle schemes started on 4 January. There is a significant proposal for Fulbourn to improve cycling safety between Yarrow Road and the Robin Hood. I am pressing for the scheme to be extended to Capital Park, for a 30 mph between Yarrow Road and The Robin Hood and a safe crossing for the city bound bus stop serving the Beechwoods. The completion of the improvements to Fulbourn rest on the Ida Darwin development and I have asked the South Cambs s106 officer to ensure this is included in the negotiations with the developer. I would urge the parish council to respond to the consultation. There is a public exhibition on Thursday 28 January from 17:00 - 20:00 at Cherry Hinton Village Centre, Colville Road, CB1 9EJ.
5. I have got agreement to have the worst parts of the Haggis Gap footpaths repaired (it was discovered that other than those parts already dealt with, the footpaths were not suitable for slurry sealing and could not be resurfaced under the current capital programme) and also the Pierce Lane footpath between Haggis Gap and the High Street is to be resurfaced.
6. I have taken up the Virgin Media complaints with Trading Standards and it has contacted Ofcom. Ofcom has asked dissatisfied customers to contact it through its website and seek compensation from Virgin Media.
7. I have arranged for officers to report outstanding highways matters to me for my parish council report. To ensure everything is covered could the clerk let me know of outstanding matters (with the highways reporting reference) at least two weeks prior to the parish council meeting please.

District Councillor Report to Fulbourn Parish Council

1. For South Cambs the Government revenue support grant reduces from £1.8m this year to £0.9m in 2016/17 and then £0.2m in 2017/18 then zero thereafter. There will be a small rural services grant increasing over the parliamentary term to £0.1m p.a. We are told by officers that this is a slightly worse position than we had anticipated (in that the reductions happen earlier and therefore sharper than assumed; although we had forecasted a zero position in 2019).
The New Homes Bonus (NHB) figures in the spending power analysis imply an increase for next year from £4.1m to £5.1m with this then falling back to £3.3m p.a. as the savings required for the funding of the Better Care Fund are implemented. This is a significantly better position than assumed. It is important to note though, that any additional resources from this source would be earmarked for infrastructure contributions most significantly into the City Deal pot so this would not necessarily help with the RSG reduction although Government will say that the Council's overall spending power has increased as a result.
2. The other significant issue is that South Cambs is a low tax/low spending authority (SCDC is in the lowest 15 in England) it will be subject to a £5 council tax increase referendum trigger rather than the default 2% limit. This is equivalent to a 4% limit in 2016/17. The Government has assumed the Council will implement this increase in its spending power assumptions so, in summary, it will quote South Cambs as having a 4% increase in spending power for 2016/17.
3. In summary, South Cambs will need to find an additional £0.4m of savings p.a., above the £1.4m already targeted (on a net budget of £16.4m). Alternatively, we could do this by reallocating resources from NHB away from infrastructure funding or by increasing council tax by the full £5, or a combination of all 3 measures.
4. The proposed modifications to the submitted Local Plan are now out to public consultation until 25 January 2016. For Fulbourn it is proposed to amend the Plan to reduce the extension of the Peterhouse Technology Park into the Green Belt to the Yarrow Road roundabout. This follows a review of the Inner Green Belt which agreed with my objection

that the original extension would have harmed the Green Belt between Fulbourn and Cherry Hinton. I urge the parish council to respond to the consultation which closes on 25 January 2016.

5. Fortnightly road sweeping has now returned to the High Street and having spoken to South Cambs environmental services it is hoped that surrounding roads will be covered too subject to the state of the High Street.
6. South Cambs has refunded 21 pre app fees (just under £3000) having not been able to deliver the reports. Most officers are sitting on about 7 planning applications each. Five junior planners have been recruited.
7. Sir Graham Bright the Police Commissioner has a 'Youth Fund' that can be applied too for one-off grants of up to £2,000 to support youth activities that positively engage young people, diverting them away from behaviour that can cause crime and disorder. I have passed this information to Alex Andrews.

District Report to Parish

Teversham Road Appeal

Castlefield has lodged an appeal against the decision from SCDC to refuse approval of the dwellings on the site at Teversham Road. The Parish Council will have an opportunity to respond to this appeal by the 27th January. All the information already submitted will be on file and taken into account. It will need to be decided how the Parish Council will want to be represented at this appeal. The developers will have appointed legal advice and representation in the form of a QC. The Parish Council along with other groups in Fulbourn such as Fulbourn Fields and residents groups will need to decide how they are represented so as they can best cope with cross examination and scrutiny on reasons given for refusal.

Consultation on cycleway proposals

Residents of Fulbourn will be getting details of the proposed Eastern Access Cycleway as this is up for consultation between 4th January and 15th February. I have attended the consultation process at Shire Hall to discuss this issue. I believe the plans will benefit the residents on the Beechwoods estate who cycle to and from work into the city along Fulbourn Road as access will be made easier from the estate to the new cycleways. Clearly these cycleways will benefit residents in Fulbourn village (such as myself) who cycle along this road on their daily commute. It is for this reason that I am in favour of these alterations and want to see them implemented. I do feel that the link between Fulbourn village and the city will be improved by this alteration but could be more ambitious by extending the designated cycle lane all the way down to Yarrow Road. Furthermore I would like to see some sort of lighting down Cambridge Road to make cyclists feel more comfortable about using the shared cycle path. Currently I believe some cyclists are opting to still cycle on the road (which is very busy at peak times) so as not to get held up or more worryingly have a collision with a pedestrian on the cycle/shared pathway. This situation would definitely be helped by lighting or a totally separate cycle path along Cambridge Road. I think this is unlikely to be achievable but it doesn't hurt to have a vision when money is being allocated through the City Deal specifically for linking surrounding villages into Cambridge central with designated cycle paths.

Tree works

The SCDC tree surgery contractors have now completed the tree works that were discussed in previous Parish meetings. The two trees at the end of Shelford Road that have been cut back have been done so to

make the path safe and passable for pedestrians. In Fromont Close paths have been cleared of overhanging debris and all trees trimmed back. The contractors also have cut back trees and overgrowing bushes surrounding one of the street lamps on Fromont Close as the light was totally masked by the overgrowing branches and bushes.

The Local Plan

The Local Plan consultation is taking place and Parishes will be expected to reply to this by 25th January. On the whole I am pleased with the changes made to the Local Plan as I feel they are balanced in terms of housing, employment and protecting the Greenbelt as much as possible. I will be voting for these amendments and I hope that the Local Plan goes through as quickly as possible as this will protect our village from speculative development. I believe that Fulbourn does very well in the Local Plan as the Greenbelt that we are surrounded by is protected and not earmarked for further development to meet our districts housing needs.

Minutes of a Meeting of the **Finance Committee** of Fulbourn Parish Council held on Wednesday, 16th December 2015, at The Fulbourn Centre.

Present: Councillors Drage (Chairman), Bullen, Cone, Thorn; R.F.O. Terry Fretwell and the Clerk.

1 Apologies for Absence. Cllr Newell.

2 Minutes of the meeting held on 28th October 2015.

The minutes were accepted as a true record.

3 Matters arising. All on agenda.

4 Finance report – up to November 2015.

Terry Fretwell went through the Cost Centres report; most of the centre budgets are underspent although the quarter up to December does incur a lot of expenditure. The Repairs & Maintenance and Cemetery budgets have not been spent whilst revenue from the cemetery is steady. Grass cutting costs are rising; £4,000 has been spent from the Youth project to demolish the old Guide Hut. Terry showed from the Project report that budgets for the Pavilion, Cemetery, Highways and Tennis Courts have not been spent.

5 Parish Precept 2016/17.

Terry explained the Precept Estimate he had prepared. He advised that general expenditure was usually higher from September to November and the £10/11K spent already needs to be put back up to £150K for the Youth Project.

Cllrs Cone and Thorn will consider the request to continue funding street lights in four village locations and report back to Council.

Following discussion the Committee recommends increasing the Precept to £135,000 which works out on average an increase of 14p per household per week.

6 Donation requests.

Hearing Help provide monthly sessions at The Swifts and as a local charity, they have requested financial assistance. Cllr Thorn suggested providing The Swifts venue free of charge to assist them. This is the recommendation of the Committee.

There was no further business and the meeting closed at 8.00pm.

Minutes of a Recreation Ground Working Party meeting held on Tuesday, 5th January 2016.

- 1 **Present:** G Ward (Chairman) and David Smith – Fulbourn Parish Council
Richard Drage – Football and John Pearce – Bowls.
- 2 **Apologies** were received from Polly Butt – Tennis.
- 3 The Minutes of the last meeting were accepted as a true record.
- 4 Matters arising - all on agenda

- 5 **Pavilion Extension.** R Drage reported that the architect had met Robin Newell and produced an outline of what is required.

- 6 **Dog fouling.** Still a problem; for example, Fulbourn Bluebirds had reported having to clear faeces from the second pitch on Sunday, 20th December 2015 before their match.

- 7 **MUGA-Defibrillation.** R Drage reported at present the defibrillator is sited in a kitchen cupboard in the pavilion and a notice with regards its location is on the actual cupboard door.

- 8 **Mowers.** As stated in the minutes of the last meeting the mowers will be stored in the new container at the Balsham Road end of the main pitch. Until the ground is dryer the container cannot be sited.

- 9 **Skate Park.** The new skate park has been completed and officially opened. No mass invasion from outside the village to use the new facility.

- 10 **Wicksteed.** Gill Ward reported that Wicksteed would not be asked to do future inspections as they were found to be wanting in their reports which were not acceptable. Many items were not brought to the Council's attention in these reports.

- 11 **Rabbits and Moles.** The mole catcher has done a good job but there will always be a problem because you cannot eliminate rabbits and moles completely. There is also evidence of muntjac deer in the area.

- 12 **Spraying.** It is proposed to spray the recreation ground in the Spring (April/May).

- 13 **AOB.**
 - a) Dave Smith to check new LED lights in recreation ground car park which are not working properly. He pointed out that the light should still be under guarantee.

 - b) Richard Drage reported that an infra heater element in the old changing room needs replacing; he also advised that one of the shower head touch pads was not working but pointed this out to the Shelford Heating maintenance engineer who said he would look at the problem

 - c) Gill Ward reported that Nick Fison would cut the hedge next to the main pitch and also parallel to Stonebridge Lane.
New boot brushes needed outside pavilion.
Potholes on car parks need filling with hoggin before spreading with shingle.
